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
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I. Introduction: Understanding

His exceptional diligence and commitment to his responsibilities made him indispensable, and his peers could not accuse him of negligence or corruption. Beyond his professional integrity, Daniel's ability to interpret dreams and solve complex problems was a testament to his intimate relationship with God. His wisdom and insight came directly from his dependence on God for guidance, not from human intellect or ambition. These attributes set Daniel apart, making him a beacon of godly excellence in a secular environment.

Even when faced with opposition, Daniel's commitment to excellence did not waver. His adversaries, jealous of his favor with the king, sought to undermine him by attacking his spiritual practices. Yet, Daniel's steadfast faith and unwavering devotion to prayer became his greatest defense. His reliance on God

not only preserved his life in the lion's den but also led to his continued promotion and influence in the kingdom. Daniel's story teaches us that excellence rooted in God's presence opens doors for Kingdom impact. It reminds us that when we dedicate our gifts and talents to God's service, He uses them to reflect His glory and transform the world around us.

2. Joseph—A Model of Excellence in Adversity

Even when falsely accused by Potiphar's wife and imprisoned, Joseph maintained his character and continued to act with integrity. Rather than succumbing to bitterness or despair, he excelled in his new circumstances, earning the respect of the prison warden and those around him. Furthermore, Joseph's ability to interpret dreams, a gift from God, became the key to his eventual rise to power in Egypt. Through this gift, he not only secured his release but also saved countless lives during a severe famine, demonstrating how excellence, grounded in faithfulness and reliance on God, can lead to divine promotion and purpose. Joseph's story is a powerful reminder that adversity does not diminish the potential for excellence; rather, it becomes the platform for God's glory to be revealed through us.

3. Jesus Christ—Our Ultimate Example of Excellence

Jesus Christ stands as the supreme example of excellence, leaving no aspect of His mission incomplete. In Mark 7:37, it is said of Him:

IMD MAKES APOSTOLIC VISITS TO WINNIPEG AND ST. JOHN'S DISTRICTS IN CANADA

The International Missions Director (IMD) of The Church of Pentecost, Apostle Emmanuel Agyemang Bekoe, and his wife, Mrs. Deborah Bekoe, paid a working visit to Canada recently. They worshipped with the Winnipeg District (province of Manitoba) in the British Columbia (BC) Area and the St. John's District (province of Newfoundland and Labrador) in the Ottawa-Quebec-Atlantic Area for the first time on Monday, September 23, 2024, and Tuesday, September 24, 2024.

WINNIPEG

A powerful revival and officers' ordination service was held at the Amazing Grace sanctuary in Winnipeg which was filled with excited members of the church from Winnipeg and Brandon Districts. The Thunder Bay Assembly in the District and other members of the church in the BC Area joined through the zoom platform because of the long distance to Winnipeg. As part of the service, five Elders, five deaconesses, and four deacons were ordained for the Winnipeg District. The IMD was accompanied by his wife, Mrs. Deborah Agyemang-Bekoe, the National Head of COP Canada, Apostle Ransford Obeng Gyamfi and BC Area Head, Apostle George Amon. Attendance at the service also included Brandon District Minister, Overseer Kwabena Kesse and the host District Pastor Frederick Appah with spouses Gloria Kesse and Florence Appah.

ST JOHN'S, NEWFOUNDLAND

The IMD was accompanied by the National Head of Canada, Aps. Ransford Obeng Gyamfi, the Area Head, Evg. Gabriel Addo-Asante, the National Secretary, Ps. Philip Chemel, and the district minister for Halifax District, Ovr. William Addo Addai. The delegation was met by the District Minister, P/Ovr. Benson Leku, the leadership of the District, and the congregation who were excited to witness the first-ever visit of the International Missions Director.

Aps. Emmanuel Agyemang Bekoe spoke on the topic the "Gifts of the Holy Spirit." Quoting from Proverbs 18:16, he challenged members to earnestly desire Spiritual gifts for the scriptures have said the gifts of a man will make way for him and bring him before kings. He elaborated by going through 1 Corinthians 12:1-5, 8-11. He said, the Holy Spirit is the One who imparts spiritual gifts, while Christ gives the church the ministry gifts (Ephesians 4:11). The church, he said, cannot operate on just spiritual gifts, neither can it operate on just the fruit of the Spirit. One needs both to be effective in ministry for these are like the two wings of a bird. The nine fruit of the Spirit are to make the believer become like Christ in character while the nine Spiritual gifts are to make the believer become like Christ in Charisma.

He explained the functions of the various gifts of the Spirit stirring the hearts of members to desire these gifts, for when they are in operation in the church, the world will be drawn to the church because they will see the power of God at work. He said while the Word of Wisdom is foretelling and the Word of Knowledge is forth telling and this gift brings referential fear in the church. In addition, he explained that the gift of faith (which is not the faith the brings salvation) works in conjunction with the working of miracles. This, he said, is the God kind of faith. He again added that, the gift of working of miracles is creative while the gifts of healings are curative.

Aps. Agyemang Bekoe went on to explain that when it comes to the gift of prophecy, we need to judge it by three distinct criteria: prophecy must edify, encourage, and exhort by correcting and rebuking. One does not become a prophet just because he or she receives prophetic messages, but the prophet must have the gift of discerning of spirits, word of wisdom, and word of knowledge beside the gift of prophecy. It is then that it can be said that an individual is a prophet. Discerning of Spirits, he said, is the ability to know "the man behind the man". He challenged every church member especially church leaders, to desire for this gift. For many have made a shipwreck of their marriages because they could not discern "the man behind the man", while many have been called into leadership, but they were not the right candidates. On the gift of diverse kinds of tongues and interpretation of tongues, he said this is different from that which happened in Acts 2 on the day of Pentecost. Referencing the words of Peter, he said speaking in tongues is for every believer, but the gifts of diverse kinds of tongues and interpretation of tongues is a special gift that the Holy Spirit imparts to the believer. He used various examples to explain further to the congregation.

Quoting from 1 Corinthians 14:1, he said it is the Spirit who gives these gifts, our responsibility is to earnestly desire for them. He led the church in an intensive time of prayer.


Officiating the august service was Apostle Emmanuel & Mrs. Deborah Agyemang Bekoe, International Missions Director of COP, and Apostle Ransford & Mrs. Irene Obeng Gyamfi, National Head, COP Canada. Other Area Heads who participated in the service included: Aps. Daniel & Mrs. Debbie Engmann, Aps. George & Mrs. Esther Amon, Aps. Joseph & Mrs. Mercy Fynn-Sackey, and Aps. Joseph Antwi (who represented COP USA). Among the retired ministers present were: Aps. Dr. Emmanuel & Mrs. Patience Owusu (immediate past National Head & former International Executive member), Aps. Peter & Mrs. Esther Ayerakwa, Aps. Dr. James & Mrs. Emily Mckeown Quainoo, Pastor Christian & Mrs. Georgina Popo-ola, Ps. Lawrence & Mrs. Lydia Manu and Mrs. Georgina Amaniampong, wife of Prophet Amaniampong.

Speaking on the topic "Crown of Thorns" from John 19:2, the IMD highlighted on the various types of crowns in scripture: royal crown (2 Chronicles 23:11; Esther 2:17), priestly crown (Exodus 28; 1 Peter 2:9), and diadem (Revelations 19:12), and the victor's crown which comes only through some sort of some form of suffering or pain. He illuminated on

the five kinds of victor's crowns – the crown of righteousness (2 Timothy 4:8); the crown of glory for good shepherding (2 Peter 5:4); Crown of rejoicing for soul winners (1 Thessalonians 2:19); the Imperishable Crown for self-disciplined (1 Corinthians 9:24), and the crown of life for those who lose their life for Christ (Revelations 2:10).

Aps. Bekoe stated that the suffering of believers is general, not specific and can come in various forms at various times. "The mystery is that if a person never becomes a victim of suffering, he or she can never become a victor of crowns. You become a victim of suffering before you become a victor of crowns. The challenges we go through here on earth are crowns of thorns, but we look forward to the crowns of diadem (rulership)... One day, some of us will have many crowns, others will have none. Some will rule over cities, nations, and even galaxies even though we may go through pain and suffering in our current dispensation. "

Apostle Dr. Alex Agyei Gyamera and his wife, Mrs. Love Agyei-Gyamera, were called into full time ministry of COP Canada in 1999 under the leadership of Aps. Kwesi Ackah-Baidoo (rtd), then National Head, after they had served as Field Assistant from 1996-1998 in Hamilton. Their twenty-five years' ministry took them to the following duty stations: Montreal/Ottawa district (1999-2002), Toronto District and Greater Toronto Area (2002-2008), Peel District (2008-2010), Vancouver District (2010-2014), Calgary District



(2014-2018), Western Canada Area Head (2010-2018), and Scarborough Area Head (2018-2024).

Aps. Dr. Agyei-Gyamera held the following roles in ministry: National Executive Member (1999-2023), National Evangelism Leader (2000-2003), PENTCDA Executive Director (2006-2010), National Secretary (2006-2010), National Men's Leader (2009-2023), National Pensions Board Chairman (2018-2024) among other portfolios that he discharged with diligence.

The General Council testified that "he was passionate about work of God, not giving room for mediocrity. He pursued goals set by the church in earnest. It is not surprising he was able to achieve set targets within the stipulated time frame."

The National Council of COP Canada also added: "Aps. PENTECOST 2024 CONFERENCE HELD IN GERMANY

Pentecost 2024 is a first-of-its-kind global conference that was organized by the Church of Pentecost. The conference was held from Wednesday May 15th to Saturday May 18th, 2024, at the Rudolf Weber Arena in Oberhausen, Germany. The conference was chaired by the Chairman of the Church of Pentecost, Aps. Eric Nyamekye, with tremendous support from the Pentecost 2024 Planning Committee. The occasion brought together many apostles, pastors, overseers, renowned gospel musicians and seasoned experts in the areas of business, ministry, commerce, academia and leadership.

Influenced by the theme, "A people of God unleashed to transform their world", many critical and relevant topics were presented and discussed throughout the conference. At the welcome service on May 15th, Aps. Eric Nyamekye taught and spoke powerfully on the topic, "The Church and Its Role in God's plan". Aps. Nyamekye traced the roots of the church from the days of the Israelites in God's strategic move to redeem mankind. Israel was embodied under a body of laws and under the law, followed a sinful nature until the fullness of time, when God sent His Son, Jesus Christ, to redeem those who were under the law (Gal. 4:4-5). Aps. Nyamekye emphasized that once God has chosen you, He will never let you fail. So regardless of the sins of the Israelites, God had a plan to redeem His people. Jesus Christ became the culmination of the law to transform God's people and build a Church of God that would establish a new order, a new kind of righteousness that is found in Jesus alone. The Church of God is an integral part of transforming people and bringing them to the saving grace of our Lord Jesus Christ. Aps. Nyamekye's powerful message set the tone and



built a momentum for rest of the conference. The next day, May 16^{th,} there were morning, afternoon, and evening main sessions. The morning session discussed topics such as "Rebuilding the Tent of David" by Aps. Dr Ben Debra and "The Waves of the Holy Spirit" by Aps. Dr. Amos Jimmy Markin. The afternoon session featured talks on "The City Church Concept" by Ps. John Angoh, followed by a panel discussion on the topic "Building Tomorrow's Churches Today with Ps. Richard Kwakye, Ps. Edwin Matthew, Evangelist Elvis Nague, Ps. John Angoh, and Evangelist Emmanuel Sika Kwame sharing their experiences on the mission field and how God is using them to make a difference in building a dynamic church across the nations despite the challenges. The evening session capped the day with teachings on "Kingdom Giving" by Rev. Ben Kroeske; "Unleashing Young People" by Ps. Albert





Sampana; and an impartation service by the IMD, Aps. Emmanuel Agyemang Bekoe who spoke on the message "Taking the Nations".

Similarly, on Friday, May 17, morning, afternoon and evening sessions were organized. During the morning session, Aps. Samuel Obuobi spoke on "Leading a Multicultural, Multiracial and Multinational Church". Aps. Obuobi noted that although God began with Israel as a nation, His strategy was to move "from one to many" as prophesied in Joel 2:28, "and then I will pour out my Spirit on all flesh. He emphasized that the Church has been ordained by God to be multinational, multicultural and multiracial. After his sermon, Aps. David Nyansah Hayfron spoke on the topic "Our World Today - Spheres to Take". Aps. Hayfron noted that we are in a time of great opportunities where Every Israelite, male or female, had a stake in this divine agenda. They were to be for God "a kingdom of priests."

various technologies can be used to take over different spheres. The afternoon session focused on PENSA International and Professional Networks. Rev. Kofi Owusu Boakye gave a general presentation on Pentecost Professional Networks (PPN), a platform created to mobilize talents, build skills, mentor and shape talents across the globe. His presentation was followed by a panel discussion with seasoned experts including Aps. Prof. Kwabena Agyapong-Kodua, Mr. Wim Hoddenbagh, Eld. Ing. Felix Atsrim, Mrs. Lorriane Wright-Boateng, Rev. Kofi Boakye and Eld. Dr. Joseph Siaw Agyapong of the Jospong Group. Each member of the panel shared their successes and leadership experiences in their respective fields. For example, Eld. Siaw Agyapong spoke about the 5 M's of Money: Making Money, Managing Money, Multiplying Money, Ministering Money, and Mistakes in the Application of Money. He based his discussion on the Biblical position of money and emphasized the need to strive for greater heights. The evening session featured a powerful exposition on "Building a Church for All" by Dcns. Dr. Allison Norton. Dcs. Norton emphasized the need for the local church to proactively build a church culture that is respectful of all cultures, inclusive and creates spaces for diverse leadership and belonging. Following Dcns. Dr. Norton, Aps. Eric Nyamekye delivered a message titled "The Unleashed Church", where he noted that the church must preach the gospel, preserve the gospel, demonstrate the gospel and teach the gospel.

All the services were filled with powerful worship ministrations by renowned gospel artists such as Min. Diana Hamilton, Min. Sunmisola, Min. Shirma, and Min. Niiella and the Amsterdam City Church Choir. The worship experience was an awesome moment as it lifted the whole atmosphere that stirred up great impartation from on high.

On Saturday May 18th, the last day, an unleashing service was held in the morning as the climax of the conference. Aps. Agyeman-Bekoe ministered powerfully on the sermon "A Sound from Heaven", Acts 2:1-11. He spoke about the sound from heaven that changed the lives of people from the many nations who were present when the Holy Spirit came



upon them. He expounded on the importance of each nation and their significance in the move of the Holy Spirit. Aps. Eric Nyamekye gave his closing remarks where he emphasized the need for the church to bring about a transformational change in the world. After the closing service, a street evangelism was organized, and the conference attendees were later released to their various locations.

Pastor Andrew Amankwaah, a Canadian pastor serving as Resident Missionary of COP St. Lucia, shared his experiences with ministry among Canada's indigenous peoples.

In addition to the overall spiritual experience, Pentecost 2024 was a wonderful opportunity for networking and relationship building. Many people from all nations were present in their numbers, and this fostered a strong sense of not only belonging to a mega church but also to a way where opportunities to improve and grow both spiritually and physically could be easily utilized. Pentecost 2024 was an inspiring encounter with God. And I can confidently say that the Rudolf Weber Arena became the Holy Spirit Arena. The presence of God was palpable and deeply felt by many. We look forward to Pentecost 2026 for an explosive time in the presence of God!

There were many miscarriages and that became the norm during these years. During our long wait to have a child, some friends made mockery of us in the Eastern part of Canada where we first lived before relocating to Edmonton Alberta. With the objective of giving the youth in each Area the opportunity to be empowered and transform their world through praise and worship, and evangelism outreach, the Youth Explosion events began in Montreal and Hamilton for the youth in Scarborough and North York Areas in late 2023.

Alberta experienced its Youth Explosion on April 27, 2024, with the Calgary district as the host. That is the greatest thing you can do as a leader. The more you invest in people, the more change you begin to see in the lives of others and the organization you are working


5. Be a man/women of INTEGRITY!

7. Aps. Dr. Ntumy was the epitome of bravery.



9. It's not about where you are from; it's about where your going.


In his book "Coming with Fire", it is written that Aps. Dr. Nutmy was born into a highly idolized and fetish home, and his father was a powerful fetish priest. PARTICIPATE IN DISCIPLESHIP GROUPS AND MINISTRIES TO BE WELL EQUIPPED: Lessons from Paul's letter to Titus

ne of the reasons discipleship is relevant for equipping the church is the fact that lessons are structured according to the maturity level of believers. Discipleship constitutes the foundation of our faith to matters that pertain to maturity and then issues that propel growth among many others. Our usual Sunday Services are not tailored for different audiences. The same message is preached with the intention that each person grasp a portion of what is relevant to them. If your church has active discipleship classes, it is important that you enroll in the one that is appropriate for your current level of Christian growth. Another way to be equipped is to join relevant cell groups and ministries such as Youth, Women's ministry and Men's ministry. In each of these


ministries, the information given is relevant to the members of the ministry. It is not enough to be just a Sunday church member. Real and sound growth does not last only on Sundays. Join other church groups and meetings in the course of the week tailored for your growth and if possible, ask for more clarification if you need it.

"You, however, must teach what is appropriate to sound doctrine." (Titus 2:1)

It is relevant that every believer including the newbie in Christ receives sound doctrine tailored for their growth and development in Christ. Just as it will be absurd to feed a newborn baby with meat and solid food, in the same way, the newborn in Christ requires the milk of God's words until they are developed enough to move on to solid foods. Paul wrote that "You, however, must teach what is appropriate to sound doctrine." (Titus 2:1). Titus was expected to teach sound doctrine without compromise. Then, Paul outlines basic topics relevant for the different age groups. One of the challenges in the 21st century church is dealing with generational issues with the different age groups.

Older Men

Paul's instruction to Titus concerning the older men was simple: "Teach the older men to be temperate, worthy of respect, self-controlled, and sound in faith, in love and in endurance." (Titus 2:2). There are a couple



of relevant subjects in this verse. First, Paul tasked Titus to teach the older men to be temperate: that is showing moderation or self-restraint. It is important that the older men learn how to be moderate so that they can teach the younger ones. More especially in respect of what is consumed. The second virtue was for the older men to be worthy of respect. 'Respect is earned' is a popular cliché and as absurd as this sound, if you fail to make your life worthy of respect, even the youngest of children might look down on you. The way a man carries himself, deals with life's challenges, and responds to internal and external conflicts are all important in creating a positive self-image. If a man's approach to issues is flawed, lacks moral integrity and motivated by financial gains, such a man has lost respect. The third virtue Paul tasked Titus to teach the older men is self-control. A man without self-control is like a city without walls. He can be attacked at any time. Such a man is also likely to allow unnecessary character deformities to ruin their own lives. Another important virtue the older men

were to be instructed on was to make them sound in faith. A man without sound faith is likely to be tossed about by every wind of doctrine. Such a person cannot help himself to even help others. It is important that the older men in the church have a good understanding and grasp of the fundamentals of our faith. This soundness in faith was to be taught in love and endurance. Paul urged Titus to teach older men that their faith should be demonstrated by their love and endurance.

These virtues taken altogether would equip the man of God to be well-grounded in faith and to be able to serve as good mentors for the younger ones. A man who lacks these virtues is likely to approach the things of God with lack of godliness and wisdom. A man who lacks self-restraint, lacks respect, is not selfcontrolled, and does not have a sound faith is more likely to be a disaster waiting to explode in the house of God. The least opportunity will trigger such a person to undertake all sorts of vices.

Older Women and Younger Women

In Paul's letter to Titus, he emphasized that, Titus should "teach the older women to be reverent in the way they live, not to be slanderers or addicted to much wine, but to teach what is good." (Titus 2:3). Thus, the older women are to be taught to live responsibly and respectfully, avoiding gossip, blabbering and not as wine blabbers. These vices can cause great confusion in the church if not dealt with. However, when the older women eschew these vices, then they can teach what is good. Afterall, it is more profitable to practice what one teaches. In the words of Paul to Titus, it is after the older women have imbibed and practicalized these godly principles, "then they can urge the younger women to love their husbands and children, to be selfcontrolled and pure, to be busy at home, to be kind, and to be subject to their husbands, so that no one will malign the word of God." (Titus 2:4-5). In other words, the virtues that Paul talks about must not just be messages the older women preach to the younger women. It should be a lifestyle that would be easy to emulate by the younger women.

The older women were to teach the younger women marriage and home management (love their husbands and children, to be busy at home, subject to their husbands), self-control and purity (before marriage and after marriage), kindness (compassion to one another). According to Paul, when these virtues are demonstrated in the younger women, they stand as a barrier against people maligning the word of God. Imagine if younger women in the church have been taught to demonstrate these values, the people of the world will identify the difference Christ makes. Paul's letter appealed that this mentorship role be entrusted into the hands of the older women. Thus, the older women would be equipped by Titus and they in turn will be able to equip the younger women with their lifestyles. Women are very important in church history. Even in the 21st century, it is a known fact that for a church to thrive, a few women are needed to carry the vision across. Naturally, women tend to be affable, and their friendliness lend them to become great points of contact for every new ministry. However, when the church fails to equip the women in the church with the necessary tools needed for spiritual growth, the same women can become agents of retrogression.

Young Men

In Titus 2:6-8, Paul admonished Titus this: "Similarly, encourage the young men to be selfcontrolled. In everything set them an example by doing what is good. In your teaching show integrity, seriousness and soundness of speech that cannot be condemned, so that those who oppose you may be ashamed because they have nothing bad to say about us." To Paul, selfcontrol is a virtue that the young men need to possess. Thus, the ability for the young men to control themselves, in particular their emotions and desires or the expression of their behavior, especially in difficult situations or when emotionally charged is very

important. Without self-control, the young man is like a city without walls, he can get easily broken through. Titus was also expected by Paul to set them an example by doing what is good in everything. In other words, as the young men look up to Titus, they should see an example worth emulating. As a young man, Titus was expected to show integrity, seriousness and soundness of speech that cannot be condemned in his teaching. Like a mirror, the life of Titus was expected to reflect the message he was teaching.

Never excuse yourself from ministry meetings: Evangelism, Children, Youth, Women and Men's ministries are instruments in the church to equip members with age-appropriate, and gender related topics relevant for growth.

The strength and stamina of young men can be useful assets for church growth. The energy possessed by young men can be instruments in church planting, evangelical crusades and even personal level evangelism. However, it is also possible that the same young men can become a snare to the church if their energies are channeled into wrong endeavors. Therefore, it is important for the church to acknowledge the presence of young men, train and equip them, and institute mentorship programs to aid their spiritual growth. If these are done with intentionality, the church would raise a formidable army of young men who are always resilient and ready to be kingdom

ambassadors. According to Paul, living a life without blemish will silence those who oppose Titus. In the words of Paul, "so that those who oppose you may be ashamed because they have nothing bad to say about us." Our lives as believers attract good or bad comments from people all over. If we live contrary to what we practice, we are likely to face backlash and opposition from others. Christian young men are expected to glorify God with their lifestyles. If there is no difference between us and the world, our message is of no power. In a world where social vices are rampant, having a generation of godly young men who are ready to make a positive impact in the nations is the way to go.

Conclusion

Paul's apostolic letter to Titus points out the relevance of teaching and equipping the church with age-appropriate information. Like the Cretan church, we should also desire to make room for different ages, and gender related ministries to cater for the needs of all members. Never excuse yourself from ministry meetings: Evangelism, Children, Youth, Women and Men's ministries are instruments in the church to equip members with ageappropriate, and gender related topics relevant for growth. Evangelism ministry is for everyone who calls himself or herself a believer. The Women's ministry is for all women in the church. Men's ministry is for all men. The Youth ministry is for all youth. Are you a Sunday member only or a part of various ministries in the church?

God Can Use You Irrespective of Your Weaknesses

Mathew 9:35-38

Jesus went through all the towns and villages, teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the good news of the kingdom and healing every disease and sickness. When he saw the crowds, he had compassion on them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field."

Just as the Lord Jesus sent out the twelve (Matthew 9:35-38), He also sent us to the world to preach the gospel. He told the disciples to wait in Jerusalem until they receive the power from above, which was the Holy Spirit. Evidently, when the Holy Spirit descended on them on the day of Pentecost, they received extraordinary power from on high to start propagating the gospel. The Holy Spirit gave them power to overcome their weaknesses and flaws and they were able to spread the good news. As believers, He has given us also the same power (the Holy Spirit) as He gave the people of old. Why then can't we preach the gospel vigorously as they did in the past? Or why can't we commit ourselves wholeheartedly concerning things of the kingdom? Well, as a 21st century believer myself, I can relate to some of the reasons. Sometimes we belittle ourselves thinking that we are not important because of maybe some weaknesses and flaws in our lives. Many a time too our fellow

Christians will look down upon us making us feel like as though we can't offer anything good in the kingdom's business. But remember what Apostle Paul said to his son Timothy. "Don't let anyone look down on you because you are young, but set an example for the believers in speech, in conduct, in love, in faith and in purity." 1 Timothy 4:12.

In the scriptures, there are great men of God who also had weaknesses and flaws. Some even committed murder yet the gracious and merciful God looked beyond their weaknesses and still used them to accomplish His purposes, because they were committed and had the zeal to do God's work. Below are few examples of such men.



NOAH: Genesis 9:20-23

God chose Noah and his family to repopulate the earth after the flood. But the scriptures make it clear in Genesis chapter nine that after the flood Noah planted a vineyard and drank some of its wine. The same man whom God used to save humanity, became drunk and laid naked without even realizing it. It was his two sons Shem and Japheth who took cloth to cover their father's nakedness. Noah was just another human being, he was not perfect but GOD used him to accomplish His purpose.

ABRAHAM: Genesis 16:1-4.

The Lord had revealed Himself several times to Abraham and promised him a child even though he and his wife advanced in age. After waiting a while and no child had come as the Lord had promised, his wife Sarah suggested to him to go to her maid Hagar and have children with her. Someone will think that Abraham, a man of faith would have resisted his wife's suggestion and wait upon the promise of God, however he failed. Abraham couldn't stand the temptation, he failed the test and had a child with Hagar. Yet God didn't change His mind on him; God fulfilled the promise He made to Abraham, and Sarah had a child at the end of all those mess. Abraham, the friend of God and father of faith, was also just another human being.

ISAAC: Genesis 25:27-28

Records an interesting story about Isaac (the promised child) and his wife Rebecca. The Lord had promised Abraham that through his son Isaac He would bless the world, yet the promised child was no exemption of flaws. He had twin boys with his wife Rebecca and they split the children among themselves. Esau, the oldest, was daddy's boy while Rebecca favored Jacob. Their action brought enmity between the two brothers which has transferred into subsequent generations even till now. Parents are supposed to love their children equally but this great man of God fell short on this issue because he too was another ordinary human being.

JACOB

Jacob, through whom the twelve tribes of Israel came, was a deceiver (a scammer or 419 in today's language). As we learnt earlier, his parents' actions has caused hatred between him and his brother, so through common food, he took Esau's birthright (Genesis 25:29-34). With the help of the mother, he tricked or deceived his father for the blessings that was meant for Esau (Genesis 27). After he had fled from Esau's wrath, he went to live with his uncle Laban. And the Bible records in Genesis 30:25-43 how he also deceived Laban, his uncle to have most of his livestock.

THE SONS OF JACOB

The next characters I want to discuss briefly are the 11 sons of Jacob (11 because Benjamin was not born yet). In my opinion, they were the most stubborn children in the bible. Their encounter with the Shechemites in Genesis 34, when their sister Dinah was defiled by the Prince of Shechem will make one agree with me. After the prince of Shechem had defiled Dinah, he fell in love with her and wanted to marry her. Her brothers (the 11 sons) agreed only on the conditions that all the male in

the land had to be circumcised. The men on the land agreed to their proposal and were all circumcised. On the third day when they were in pain from the circumcision, these brothers attacked the city and killed all the men in retaliation to what the prince of Shechem did to their sister. It was Simeon and Levi who started the attack yet in God's own wisdom he chose the latter that his descendants should be His priests.

In Genesis 37:12-36 it was the same men who sold their own brother Joseph into slavery. The oldest among them Reuben even once slept with his father's concubine. Remember, it was from this family that God had promised to bring the Savior to the world. Upon all the evil things they did, God did not change His mind on them, because He knew they were mere men and prone to sin.

MOSES: Exodus 32:19-20

God used Moses to deliver the people of Israel from the Egyptians. God used him to perform many wonders yet as human, he had his own shortcomings. Even before God called him, he had committed murder and was running away. At certain point, God called him to the mountain, gave him the Ten Commandments to be given to the people. When he came down from the mountain and saw the acts of the people, he got angry and threw the tablets of the law on the ground breaking them into pieces,

KING DAVID: 2 Samuel 11

King David, a man of God's own heart also committed adultery with Bathsheba Uriah's wife. When he realized that she was pregnant for him, he devised a scheme to murder the woman's husband to cover his evil tracks. After the death of Uriah David married Bathsheba and later had a son named Solomon (who later became king of Israel). When you study the genealogy of our Lord Jesus Christ this same Solomon is found somewhere in the line. David committed two great sins to have Uriah as his wife, yet God use the child from that relationship to establish the lineage of the Savior.

PROPHET ELIJAH: 1 Kings 19:1-5

One of the greatest prophets in the Bible was Elijah, a man who had the keys to shut heavens from raining and could pray for rain to come again. This great prophet of God had slaughtered multitude of Baal's prophets but when Jezebel, a woman threatened to take his life he was on his heels running to escape. Could Elijah be blamed for being afraid as a man?

APOSTLE PAUL: Acts 15:36-39


Paul, the great Apostle of all time, had a sharp argument with Barnabas because of John Mark. On their second missionary trip, Barnabas wanted to take John Mark with them but Paul refused because on their first journey, John Mark left them on the way to return home. This shouldn't have been a big deal for Paul, but the bible records that the argument among the two apostles was so strong to the extend that these two great missionaries had to depart way. Paul with Silas and obviously Barnabas with John Mark.

APOSTLE PETER

It is recorded in Galatians 2:11-13 that Apostle Peter used to eat with the gentile Christians but as soon as some of the Jewish Christians came around, he withdrew from the act because he was afraid of his Jewish brethren. Apostle Paul saw the action of Paul as hypocrisy and rebuked him.

CONCLUSION

In conclusion, as we can see from all the men and characters mentioned above that none of them was perfect. They had their own flaws and weaknesses. They were all ordinary human beings just like us, but because they had the heart to do God's work and were committed, God in His grace, saw beyond their weaknesses and used then to His glory. Likewise, if we, the 21st century Christians, will have the zeal and be committed to do the kingdom's business, the gracious God will give us more grace and will look beyond our mistakes and use us to His glory.

KNOW THE TIMES: what times are we in?

- 5. Sexual sin is on the rise- sexual images are displayed all over on billboards, advertisement, premarital sex, pornography, masturbation etc.

- 7. Religion- different types are coming up every time and it is seen as a personal choice.
- 8. The culture of Individualism- it is all about me; so far as it is right for me, it does not concern you; my choice; what I decide is the truth, me, myself, I, etc.
- 9. Truth has become absolute- what is truth for one person may differ from what is truth for the other person; what I think is true is true even if you see it as wrong.
- 10. Practicing Christianity is on the decline- lots of people call themselves Christians but just few practice Christianity (read the bible and follow the teachings its teachings),, pray, fellowship/ go to church, pay their tithes, volunteer at church etc.
- 11. Technology (Media-driven world)- we are in a mobile informed world; search the internet, it is full of immediate information, some false



some true, constant exposure to unsafe information and lies; everyone has become an expert on different topics, people share their opinions in a written form, as video or audio on the internet. Anyone can sit in their room and produce something on social media, and it gets circulated all over the world; emphasis is placed on scientific reasoning and empirical evidence/ research and these are more valid over and above that of faith.

- Artificial intelligence -the science of making machines that can think like humans; they are considered smart; a robot that performs task commonly associated with human beings eg. "Siri".
- 13. Secularism- emphasis is on materialism, instant gratification, consumerism; putting a lot of emphasis and importance on material things than spiritual; so many different goods on the market and the deception that one's happiness and well-being is dependent on consuming these things, that having many things is important, just buy just acquire.
- 14. Trials and Tribulations- financial difficulties, health challenges, relationship /marital struggle, broken homes and personal losses.
- 15. Spiritual warfare- demonic operations that have become a normal thing. People openly talk about witchcraft, Satanism and even plan conferences for these.

There are more things happening. This is the world that we live in and must raise our children. So, what do we do?

Let us look at some Bible characters (children) who may have been living in bad and disturbing times like we are, however stood for their faith and lived it.

MOSES (Exodus 2)- he was

born during a time of depression and oppression for the Israelites. They lived in slavery in Egypt. An order had been given for all male children to be killed. Can you imagine the fear, panic, misery and pain going on at that time? However, there was a brave woman called Jochebed. She knew the times and prepared for it. She knew that her son was for greatness, thus if other people's sons were to be killed, it would not be her son. So, what did she do?

She saved Moses' life and kept him safe for 3 months. When she could no longer keep him, she sent him away in a basket. Now, she had trained her daughter Miriam so well such that she was wise and brave enough to approach Pharoah's daughter and help bring her brother back to Jochebed, who was now going to be his wet Nurse (she would continue to take care of him for a couple more years before return him to Pharoah's daughter). Since she had been given another opportunity to be with her son for about 2-3yrs, what do you think she did? How did Moses eventually grow up keeping his identity or holding onto his identity as an Israelite, even though he grew up as royal in Pharoah's house?

I believe that for the period Moses was being nursed by his mother, she taught him as much as she could each day. She wanted him to always remember that he was an Israelite and not an Egyptian. (at age of 2years, children are able to observe, listen and absorb a lot and imitate as well. Within those years, I believe she invested in her son. Probably, she talked often about Jehovah their God, who He was and is, what He had done for the people of Israel. Maybe she sang songs about God's love and faithful. I am sure she spoke to him about Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and Joseph and how they came to Egypt. I am sure she did her best, having faith that it will yield good results when he grows up, and indeed it did.

ESTHER (Esther 2) - it was a time of captivity for the Jews. Can you imagine living in such times? During recession, see how terrible things are. This young lady Esther had been carried into exile with her cousin Mordecai from Jerusalem to Babylon. She was selected as one of the young virgins whom the King was going to choose as the new Queen. Now, how did Esther earn the admiration and favor of the King's eunuch (was in charge of the women) such that. he treated her in a special and gave her the best? Again, what made the king love Esther more than the other ladies? One would say it was favor from God, but were there not other Jewish young ladies present? How come Esther won the King's heart? I Believe there was more to it.



She had no parents and was raised by Mordecai. She had been taught and trained such that she stood out. Mordecai knew the times and so did his best to prepare Esther for the appointed time. He loved her but was strict with her. He taught her to believe, have faith in Jehovah and to stand for this God no matter what happened. He taught her humility and respect. He taught her how to fast and pray. When she became Queen, married to an unbeliever, the King Ahasuerus, she did not abandon her faith. In times of crisis when the Jews were in danger, it was her faith that saved them. I believe Mordecai and Jochebed as Jewish parents with Jehovah as their God, put in a lot to ensure that their children were grounded in their faith.

DANIEL AND HIS FRIENDS (DANIEL 1) -

Once again, Jewish boys in captivity in Babylon. Young boys who were strong in their faith, resolved not to defile themselves or bow to other gods in a time when paganism and idolatry was on the rise. They knew who they were, what they had (Jehovah), power and authority. They stood and lived out their faith. I believe that back in Judah, some parents had spent time to invest and train them these young men such that they knew their God Jehovah and were grounded in him.

What lessons do we learn from these characters? What should we do as parents?

- 1. Maintain strong spiritual foundations in the house, personal and family devotions. Make time for prayers, worship, bible studies, evangelism. Create environments for these practices.
- Create time and space to engage with your children, and help them grow in their understanding of God, who they are, the Holy Spirit and God's role in their lives and their role as children of God.
- Allow your children to ask questions. No question is foolish, even if it is, be patient and make time to answer. If you do not know the answer to their questions, be honest and tell them you don't know but will find out for them (this teaches them honesty). Make sure you find out the answers and get back to them. You could also suggest that you find the answers to their questions together.
- Make room so they can share some of their challenges and find ways of coming up with solutions with them. Share some of your struggles and how you overcame them with God's help.

- Make time to discuss trending topics like mental health, gender and sexual diversity (LGBTQ+), drug and substance abuse, addictions, sexual misconduct, Halloween. Know their thoughts regarding these and how it affects their faith. Seek opportunities for respectful dialogues. Be willing to listen and understand their perspective. Talk about practical ways of living their faith in these times. Use God's word, prayers and the Holy Ghost's power in all discussions.
- 2. Practice your faith. Teach and Model.
- Prioritize your relationship with God and encourage them to do same. Let them experience the power of God in your life and theirs as well. It's important that they encounter God for themselves. Teach and train them to rely and depend on God's strength, the power of the Holy Spirit and to stay rooted in His word. Model how to openly live our faith. Let them see the power of God at work in your life.
- Practice forgiveness at home and outside the home (in church). Model that for your children to see. Apologize and ask for forgiveness when you go wrong. Say "I am sorry". Then teach them to apologize and forgive one another. Be interested in what goes on around the house and even in school.
- Show love and compassion. Model it in your own way and teach them to do so (at home and outside). Use positive language, learn to

use encouraging words and teach them to do same. Provide support and guidance and acceptance. Model an environment of safety and security, being there during times of need.

- Encourage service. Volunteer together as a family. Look for opportunities to serve at church and in the community.
- Foster and build strong communication and relationships. Prioritize family relationship/friendship with one another, sharing love, respect, kindness towards one another, strengthening the bond within the family. Model and teach them conflict resolution in a godly way.
- Discipline your children where necessary in a godly manner. Explain why the discipline and let them learn from it, so they'll become responsible and Christ-`like. Model how to behave at home and outside, especially at church and teach them to do likewise. Teach them to respect the house of God and everything within it, including the chairs and instruments, as well as keeping it clean.

Know how you'll train your toddler otherwise at about age 6 years onward, you'll have a hard time reversing some learnt behaviors. Know how to deal and handle your children in the different phases of life (baby, toddler, elementary, high school, postsecondary, worker). The way you interact with them at each stage will be different. Learn, know and practice it. Involve the children and learn from them.

The Altar Call


